

GENERIC NAME: Dextroamphetamine and Amphetamine Tablets (deks troe am FET a meen & am FET a meen)

WARNING: This drug has a risk of abuse and misuse. This drug may also be habit-forming if taken for a long time. Do not take for longer than you have been told by your doctor. Use only as you were told. Tell your doctor if you have ever abused or been addicted to any drugs or alcohol. Misuse of this drug may cause heart-related side effects or even sudden death. COMMON USES: It is used to treat attention deficit problems with hyperactivity. It is used to treat narcolepsy. It may be given to you for other reasons. Talk with the doctor.

BEFORE USING THIS MEDICINE: WHAT DO I NEED TO TELL MY DOCTOR BEFORE I TAKE THIS DRUG? TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you are allergic to this drug; any part of this drug; or any other drugs, foods, or substances. Tell your doctor about the allergy and what signs you had. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you or a family member have any of these health problems: Blood vessel disease, high blood pressure, heart structure problems or other heart problems, or Tourette's syndrome or tics. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you have any of these health problems: Glaucoma, agitation, anxiety, or overact ive thyroid. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you have ever had any of these health problems: Drug abuse or stroke. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you have kidney disease. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you are taking any of these drugs: Acetazolamide or sodium bicarbonate. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you have taken certain drugs for depression or Parkinson's disease in the last 14 days. This includes isocarboxazid, phenelzine, tranylcypromine, selegiline, or rasagiline. Very high blood pressure may happen. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you are taking any of these drugs: Linezolid or methylene blue. TELL YOUR DOCTOR: If you are breast-feeding. Do not breast-feed while you take this drug. This is not a list of all drugs or health problems that interact with this drug. Tell your doctor and pharmacist about all of your drugs (prescription or OTC, natural products, vitamins) and health problems. You must check to make sure that it is safe for you to take this drug with all of your drugs and health problems. Do not start, stop, or change the dose of any drug without checking with your doctor.

HOW TO USE THIS MEDICINE: HOW IS THIS DRUG BEST TAKEN? Use this drug as ordered by your doctor. Read all information given to you. Follow all instructions closely. Take with or without food. Take last dose of the day at least 4 hours before bedtime. HOW DO I STORE AND/OR THROW OUT THIS DRUG? Store at room temperature protected from light. Store in a dry place. Do not store in a bathroom. Keep all drugs in a safe place. Keep all drugs out of the reach of children and pets. Throw away unused or expired drugs. Do not flush down a toilet or pour down a drain unless you are told to do so. Check with your pharmacist if you have questions about the best way to throw out drugs. There may be drug take-back programs in your area. WHAT DO I DO IF I MISS A DOSE? Take a missed dose as soon as you think about it. If it is close to the time for your next dose, skip the missed dose and go back to your normal time. Do not take 2 doses at the same time or extra doses.

CAUTIONS: Tell all of your health care providers that you take this drug. This includes your doctors, nurses, pharmacists, and dentists. Avoid driving and doing other tasks or actions that call for you to be alert until you see how this drug affects you. If you have been taking this drug for a long time or at high doses, it may not work as well and you may need higher doses to get the same effect. This is known as tolerance. Call your doctor if this drug stops working well. Do not take more than ordered. If you have been taking this drug for many weeks, talk with your doctor before stopping. You may went to slowly stop this drug. You may need to have some heart tests before starting this drug. If you have questions, talk with your doctor. This drug may cause high blood pressure. Check blood pressure and heart rate as the doctor has told you. Have blood work checked as you have been told by the doctor. Talk with the doctor. This drug may affect certain lab tests. Tell all of your health care providers and lab workers that you take this drug. Do not take antacids with this drug. Talk with your doctor before using OTC products that may raise blood pressure. These include cough or cold drugs, diet pills, stimulants, ibuprofen or like products, and some natural products or aids. New or worse behavior and mood changes like change in thinking, anger, and hallucinations have happened with this drug. Tell your doctor if you or a family member have any mental or mood problems like depression or bipolar illness, or if a family member has committed suicide. Call your doctor right away if you have hallucinations; change in the way you act; or signs of mood changes like depression, thoughts of suicide, nervousness, emotional ups and downs, thinking that is not normal, anxiety, or lack of interest in life. A severe and sometimes deadly problem called serotonin syndrome may happen if you take this drug with certain other drugs. Call your doctor right away if you have agitation; change in balance; confusion; hallucinations; fev

POSSIBLE SIDE EFFECTS: WHAT ARE SOME SIDE EFFECTS THAT I NEED TO CALL MY DOCTOR ABOUT RIGHT AWAY? WARNING/CAUTION: Even though it may be rare, some people may have very bad and sometimes deadly side effects wh en taking a drug. Tell your doctor or get medical help right away if you have any of the following signs or symptoms that may be related to a very bad side effect: Signs of an allergic reaction, like rash; hives; itching; red, swollen, blistered, or

peeling skin with or without fever; wheezing; tightness in the chest or throat; trouble breathing, swallowing, or talking; unusual hoarseness; or swelling of the mouth, face, lips, tongue, or throat. WHAT ARE SOME OTHER SIDE EFFECTS OF THIS DRUG? All drugs may cause side effects. However, many people have no side effects or only have minor side effects. Call your doctor or get medical help if any of these side effects or any other side effects bother you or do not go away: Feeling nervous and excitable. Headache. Trouble sleeping. DEXTROAMPHETAMINE SACCHARATE, AMPHETAMINE ASPARTATE, DEXTROAMPHETAMINE SULFATE AND AMPHETAMINE SULFATE

(DEX-troe-am-FET-uh-meen SACK-uh-rate, am-FET-uh-meen ass-PAR-tate, DEX-troe-am-FET-uh-meen SULL-fate, and am-FET-uh-meen SULL-fate)

TABLETS (MIXED SALTS OF A SINGLÉ ENTITY AMPHETAMINE PRODUCT) CII

Read the Medication Guide that comes with dextroamphetamine saccharate, amphetamine aspartate, dextroamphetamine sulfate and amphetamine sulfate tablets (mixed amphetamine salts) before you or your child starts taking it and each time you get a refill. There may be new information. This Medication Guide does not take the place of talking to your doctor about you or your child's treatment with mixed amphetamine salts.

What is the most important information I should know about mixed amphetamine salts?

The following have been reported with use of mixed amphetamine salts and other stimulant medicines.

1. Heart-related problems:

- sudden death in patients who have heart problems or heart defects
- · stroke and heart attack in adults
- · increased blood pressure and heart rate

Tell your doctor if you or your child have any heart problems, heart defects, high blood pressure, or a family history of these problems.

Your doctor should check you or your child carefully for heart problems before starting mixed amphetamine salts.

Your doctor should check your or your child's blood pressure and heart rate regularly during treatment with mixed amphetamine salts.

Call your doctor right away if you or your child have any signs of heart problems such as chest pain, shortness of breath, or fainting while taking mixed amphetamine salts.

2. Mental (Psychiatric) problems:

All Patients

- · new or worse behavior and thought problems
- · new or worse bipolar illness
- · new or worse aggressive behavior or hostility

Children and Teenagers

 new psychotic symptoms (such as hearing voices, believing things that are not true, are suspicious) or new manic symptoms

Tell your doctor about any mental problems you or your child have, or about a family history of suicide, bipolar illness, or depression.

Call your doctor right away if you or your child have any new or worsening mental symptoms or problems while taking mixed amphetamine salts, especially seeing or hearing things that are not real, believing things that are not real, or are suspicious.

3. Circulation problems in fingers and toes [Peripheral Vasculopathy, Including Raynaud's Phenomenon]:

- · Fingers or toes may feel numb, cool, painful
- Fingers or toes may change color from pale, to blue, to red

Tell your doctor if you have or your child has numbness, pain, skin color change, or sensitivity to temperature in your fingers or toes.

Call your doctor right away if you have or your child has any signs of unexplained wounds appearing on fingers or toes while taking mixed amphetamine salts.

What are mixed amphetamine salts?

Mixed amphetamine salts are a central nervous system stimulant prescription medicine. It is used for the treatment of Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). Mixed amphetamine salts may help increase attention and decrease impulsiveness and hyperactivity in patients with ADHD.

Mixed amphetamine salts should be used as a part of a total treatment program for ADHD that may include counseling or other therapies.

Mixed amphetamine salts are also used in the treatment of a sleep disorder called narcolepsy.

Mixed amphetamine salts are a federally controlled substance (CII) because it can be abused or lead to dependence. Keep mixed amphetamine salts in a safe place to prevent misuse and abuse. Selling or giving away mixed amphetamine salts may harm others, and is against the law.

Tell your doctor if you or your child have (or have a family history of) ever abused or been dependent on alcohol, prescription medicines or street drugs.

Who should not take mixed amphetamine salts? Mixed amphetamine salts should not be taken if you or your child:

- have heart disease or hardening of the arteries
- · have moderate to severe high blood pressure
- have hyperthyroidism
- have an eye problem called glaucoma
- · are very anxious, tense, or agitated
- have a history of drug abuse
- are taking or have taken within the past 14 days an antidepression medicine called a monoamine oxidase inhibitor or MAOI.
- are sensitive to, allergic to, or had a reaction to other stimulant medicines

Mixed amphetamine salts are not recommended for use in children less than 3 years old.

Mixed amphetamine salts may not be right for you or your child. Before starting mixed amphetamine salts tell your or your child's doctor about all health conditions (or a family history of) including:

- heart problems, heart defects, high blood pressure
- mental problems including psychosis, mania, bipolar illness, or depression
- · tics or Tourette's syndrome

- · liver or kidney problems
- · circulation problems in fingers and toes
- · thyroid problems
- seizures or have had an abnormal brain wave test (EEG)

Tell your doctor if you or your child are pregnant, planning to become pregnant, or breastfeeding.

Can mixed amphetamine salts be taken with other medicines? Tell your doctor about all of the medicines that you or your child take including prescription and nonprescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Mixed amphetamine salts and some medicines may interact with each other and cause serious side effects. Sometimes the doses of other medicines will need to be adjusted while taking mixed amphetamine salts.

Your doctor will decide whether mixed amphetamine salts can be taken with other medicines.

Especially tell your doctor if you or your child take:

- · anti-depression medicines including MAOIs
- · blood pressure medicines
- · seizure medicines
- · blood thinner medicines
- · cold or allergy medicines that contain decongestants
- · stomach acid medicines

Know the medicines that you or your child take. Keep a list of your medicines with you to show your doctor and pharmacist.

Do not start any new medicine while taking mixed amphetamine salts without talking to your doctor first.

How should mixed amphetamine salts be taken?

- Take mixed amphetamine salts exactly as prescribed. Your doctor may adjust the dose until it is right for you or your child.
- Mixed amphetamine salt tablets are usually taken two to three times a day. The first dose is usually taken when you first wake in the morning. One or two more doses may be taken during the day, 4 to 6 hours apart.
- · Mixed amphetamine salts can be taken with or without food.
- From time to time, your doctor may stop mixed amphetamine salts treatment for a while to check ADHD symptoms.
- Your doctor may do regular checks of the blood, heart, and blood pressure while taking mixed amphetamine salts. Children should have their height and weight checked often while taking mixed amphetamine salts. Mixed amphetamine salts treatment may be stopped if a problem is found during these check-ups.
- If you or your child take too much mixed amphetamine salts or overdose, call your doctor or poison control center right away, or get emergency treatment.

What are possible side effects of mixed amphetamine salts? See "What is the most important information I should know about mixed amphetamine salts?" for information on reported heart and mental problems.

Other serious side effects include:

- · slowing of growth (height and weight) in children
- seizures, mainly in patients with a history of seizures
- · eyesight changes or blurred vision
- serotonin syndrome. A potentially life-threatening problem called serotonin syndrome can happen when medicines such

as mixed amphetamine salts are taken with certain other medicines. Symptoms of serotonin syndrome may include:

- agitation, hallucinations, coma or other changes in mental status
- o problems controlling your movements or muscle twitching
- fast heartbeat
- high or low blood pressure
- sweating or fever
- nausea or vomiting
- o diarrhea
- muscle stiffness or tightness

Common side effects include:

- · stomach ache
- decreased appetite
- nervousness

Mixed amphetamine salts may affect your or your child's ability to drive or do other dangerous activities.

Talk to your doctor if you or your child have side effects that are bothersome or do not go away.

This is not a complete list of possible side effects. Ask your doctor or pharmacist for more information.

Call your doctor for medical advice about side effects. You may report side effects to FDA at 1-800-FDA-1088.

How should I store mixed amphetamine salts?

- Store mixed amphetamine salts in a safe place at room temperature, 20° to 25°C (68° to 77°F).
- Keep mixed amphetamine salts and all medicines out of the reach of children.

General information about mixed amphetamine salts

Medicines are sometimes prescribed for purposes other than those listed in a Medication Guide. Do not use mixed amphetamine salts for a condition for which it was not prescribed. Do not give mixed amphetamine salts to other people, even if they have the same condition. It may harm them and it is against the law. This Medication Guide summarizes the most important information about mixed amphetamine salts. If you would like more information, talk with your doctor. You can ask your doctor or pharmacist for information about mixed amphetamine salts that was written for healthcare professionals.

What are the ingredients in mixed amphetamine salts?

Active Ingredient: dextroamphetamine saccharate, amphetamine aspartate, dextroamphetamine sulfate and amphetamine sulfate. Inactive Ingredients: If you need more information about the inactive ingredients in this medicine ask your pharmacist for a complete list.

YOUR RIGHTS

When it comes to your health information, you have certain rights. This section explains your rights and some of our responsibilities to help you.

Get an electronic or paper copy of your medical record

- You can ask to see or get an electronic or paper copy of your medical record and other health information we have about you. Ask us how.
- · We will provide a copy or a summary of your health information, usually within 30 days of your request. We may charge a reasonable, cost-based fee.

Ask us to correct your medical record

- You can ask us to correct health information about you that you think is incorrect or incomplete. Ask us how to do this.
- · We may say "no" to your request, but we'll tell you why in writing within 60 days.

Request confidential communications

- · You can ask us to contact you in a specific way (for example, home or office phone) or to send mail to a different address.
- · We will say "yes" to all reasonable requests.

Ask us to limit what we use or share

- You can ask us not to use or share certain health information for treatment, payment, or our operations. We are not required to agree to your request, and we may say "no" if it would affect your care.

Get a list of those with whom we've shared information

In these cases, you have both the right and choice to tell us to:

- · Share information with your family, close friends, or others involved in your care
- · Share information in a disaster relief situation

If you are not able to tell us your preference, for example if you are unconscious, we may go ahead and share your information if we believe it is in your best interest. We may also share your information when needed to lessen a serious and imminent threat to health or safety.

The Pharmacy will not disclose the following categories of individual identifiable health information except in situations where the subject of the information has provided us with a written authorization allowing the release, or where we are permitted or required by state or federal law to make the disclosure. These categories include HIV/AIDS, mental health, communicable disease, alcohol and substance abuse, genetic information, information pertaining to minors and reproductive rights.
