## NOTES

- A. Algeria Ben Bella seems to have the upper hand for the moment over the latest military challenge to his rule. Government forces have occupied the main towns in the Biskra area, and Chabaane has presumably taken to the hills. Chabaane's action was not coordinated with other elements of Ben Bella's divided opposition in Constantine, Oran or the Kayblie.
- B. Tanganyika-Zanzibar The East Germans and Soviets are still stalling on reducing their embassies on Zanzibar to consulates as directed by union officials for 1 July. Both may be hoping to put off a decision until Nyerere and Kambona depart next week for a round of conferences which will keep these champions of the union out of the country for most of July. North Vietnam is apparently complying.
